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Игра "Рождественский футбол" для учащихся 5–6-х классов

Подготовка к игре

Участники игры делятся на две команды по 11 человек в каждой:

вратарь — 1 полузащитники — 4 защитники — 4 нападающие — 2

Команды должны придумать себе название и гимн, который они исполняют в начале игры, выстроившись на игровом поле. Все игроки одеты в футболки одного цвета.

Для ворот натянуть две сетки — гирлянды. Для рефери приготовить свисток.

Правила игры

Все задания выполняются от вратаря, который передает пас полузащитникам, те, в свою очередь, защитникам и нападающим. После того как все ответили, чтобы забить гол, нужно успеть первыми донести мяч (задание) к воротам, в которых стоят рефери.

2. Christmas Song game

How to play:

the teams are to guess the melody. If the team guesses the introduction to a song it gets a point.

Christmas songs to guess:

Jingle Bells Oh, Christmas Tree Deck the Halls Sing Noel The Twelve Days of Christmas Let it Snow, Let it Snow, Let it Snow! It's Christmas day today Frosty the Snowman We wish you a merry Christmas All around the world Silent Night



While the referees are calculating the number of points for each team the teacher can tell the story of the song *Silent Night*.

Silent Night is the most popular Christmas carol around the world. It is the song that stopped a war. On Christmas Eve during World War I, German soldiers held up Christmas trees lit with candles in the trenches and began singing *Silent Night*: "Stille nacht, heilige nacht." Soon the British soldiers joined them in the singing of this beautiful song. The soldiers from both sides left the trenches and met in the middle and some of them even exchanged gifts. The fighting stopped and there was "peace on Earth" for that one night in history.

3. Cotton Beard game

How to play:

The teams line up and put some vaseline or other cream all over their face or chin. The point of the game is to run to the other side of the room, put the face into a bowl of cotton and stick as many cotton balls as possible to the face or chin and then run back so that the next person can go. The winning team is the one who has the most cotton balls in the shortest time.

4. Draw on Your Head game

How to play:

Everyone places the English text book on their head with a piece of blank paper on it. The game presenter gives instructions. Without looking, the participants have to draw what the presenter says on the piece of paper on their head. For example the presenter says: "Draw a Christmas tree. Draw a star on top of your tree. Draw a present under the Christmas tree. Draw a Fireplace. Stick a stocking on your fireplace. That's it."

Scoring: e.g.

- 2 points for every line that joins another line,
- 1 point if the stocking touches the mantel,
- 1 point if the star touches the tree,
- 1 point for every Christmas ball that is on the tree, etc.

The winner is the person with the most points.

How to play:

8. Why – game

How to play:

Answer the questions. The team, which gives the right answer, scores.

- 1. Why is a star the symbol of Christmas? (It tells about the birth of Jesus Christ, the Saviour.)
- 2. Why is a Christmas tree the symbol of Christmas? (It indicates the everlasting hope of mankind, the Trinity).
- 3. Why is red the colour of Christmas? (It reminds of the Blood of Jesus).
- 4. Why is a bell the symbol of Christmas? (It proclaims the Good news, our Shepard will never leave us).
- 5. Why is a candle the symbol of Christmas? (It shows that Jesus is the light to the world).
- 6. Why is a Christmas candy cane the symbol of Christmas? (It represents the Shepherd's crook. Jesus is our Shepherd who died for us).
- 7. Why is a wreath the symbol of Christmas? (It symbolizes the eternal love).
- 8. Why are tinsels and ribbons the symbols of Christmas? (Tinsel adds brightness to Christmas just as the many kindnesses we do for others bring brightness into their lives. The ribbon is tied into a bow to remind us that our lives are intertwined with each other, and the help we give others is constantly returned to us in different ways.
- 9. Why are gifts the symbols of Christmas? (They represent the greatest gift of all God's Son and also the gifts of the Magi).
- 10. Why is the stocking the symbol of Christmas? (It reminds of the legend about St Nicholas who dropped gold into a poor man's window for his three daughters' weddings. The gold fell into the stockings which were hung by the fireplace to dry).
- 11. Why do we sing carols at Christmas? (They tell about Jesus's birth).
- 12. Why are Santa and St Nicholas different? (St Nicholas lived in Turkey. He loved God and gave money to the needy).

9. Penalty game "12 Days of Christmas"

How to play:

Sing a song *The Twelve Days of Christmas*. Each of the twelve days of Christmas corresponds to a month of the year. E.g. First day = January,

second day = February, etc. When you hear the line corresponding to your birthday month, stand up; when it's finished, sit down. You also stand up whenever you hear the name of the gift for that day.

For example, my birthday is in March, so I stood when I hear "On the third day of Christmas my true love sent to me three French hens" and whenever we all sang "...four calling birds (stand up), three French hens (sit down), two turtle doves."

If any of the team players makes a mistake, the other team gets a point.

The Twelve Days of Christmas is an English Christmas carol which enumerates a series of gifts given on each of the twelve days of Christmas. It is a <u>cumulative song</u>, meaning that each verse is built on top of the previous verses. There are twelve verses, each describing a gift given by "my true love" on one of the twelve days of Christmas.
